Young people from East London present two fascinating short films documenting our love affair with the nation's favourite brew: TEA.

Tea is an intergenerational heritage film project led by young people at Mouth That Roars (MTR) and supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF). Young film makers from MTR have produced two short films 'Two Leaves & a Bud' and 'Fancy a Cuppa?' which are due to be screened at The Geffrye Museum and on board Cutty Sark.

In March this year, twelve young people from East London began working in partnership with local youth media project, Mouth That Roars, the Geffrye Museum, Royal Museums Greenwich and the Heritage lottery youth grants programme, Young Roots, to investigate the history of tea.

"We've been delighted to welcome Mouth That Roars to Greenwich, helping young people in their journey to uncover the history of tea in Britain. It's fantastic to see young people volunteering their time to learn new sills whilst creating a community—wide conversation around the role of tea in multicultural Britain, both past and present." The young film makers have researched, filmed, cast and directed two short films. One film documents the fascinating and often dangerous history of tea, from its early beginnings in China to our busy East London docks. Who knew that the innocent cup of tea, that is enjoyed daily by so many, is the result of bloody wars, slavery and drug addiction?

Today, research shows that over 160 million cups of tea are drunk by people in the UK every day now that's dedication! During their research phase, young people have hosted a number of Community Tea Parties in East London with participatory artist Sadia Ur-Rehman and the second film takes a look at the incredible social history of tea. Recording the memories of local people and elders and sharing stories over tea and cake. It seems that no matter where you're from or how old you are there is a strong connection with our ubiquitous cuppa, as guest at our Community Tea Parties have told us:

"Tea! I LOVE tea I could not get out of the house in the morning without a pint of tea!"

"I do like tea. It reminds me a lot of when I first came over to London from Ireland. I wasn't a tea drinker then and I came to live with me sister and everywhere we went to visit me family the kettle was on and there always tea!"

"Years ago Brooke Bond made tea and you used to get cards with it, like cigarette cards, you get a series of animals or famous films stars and you'd collect these cards or swap them at school sometimes. Tea cards...little tiny cards..they don't do them anymore."

"I come from Jamaica and when I first started working here we used to stop work at about 10 o'clock for morning tea. I really didn't like it but gradually, gradually I was forced into it and that how I become to really like tea!"

"What would we do without our tea? It's part of Britain isn't it?"

The young people's incredible journey of discovery has taken them to tea tastings at Twinings, High Tea at the Hotel Cafe Royal and leafing through archives at The Sainsbury Archive. They have made herbal teas with The Geffrye Museum, learnt about trade on the high seas at the National Maritime Museum, how tea impacted on local area at The London Docklands Museum and seen what life was like for sailors on board the famous tea clipper, *Cutty Sark*.

'I felt really nervous that I would touch the real pieces of time. It was amazing [filming at The Geffrye Museum] the museum is great, we filmed period tea inserts covering the 1700s, 1800s 1930s up to today. It was fantastic to film in the period rooms in costume!' MTR young film maker.

Their epic journey culminates with two film screenings.

### 1. 'Tea at the Geffrye' a Public Film Screening at The Geffrye Museum:

The first screening of 'Two Leaves and a Bud' will be served with tea and cakes at The Geffrye Museum on Wednesday 24th August at 2pm. Groups are invited to come along to The Geffrye Museum.
